



#### You Impacted OUD Structure Measures!

#### Baseline compared to October-December 2020

Standardized education materials for OUD/NAS

41% vs. 84% (143%)

Used a validated, self-report screening tool for substance use in pregnancy

36% vs. 70% (134%)

Provide opioid pharmacotherapy for pregnant women with OUD

52% vs. 77% (125%)


Developed referral relationships with OUD treatment programs

70% vs. 93% (123%)

Developed clinical pathways/order sets for pregnant women with OUD

34% vs. 66% (**1**32%)

# You Impacted NAS Structure Measures!

#### Baseline compared to October-December 2020

Percentage of nursing staff caring for newborns trained in validated assessments for NAS

63% vs. 80% (17%)

QI efforts in place to increase inter-rater reliability for NAS assessments
23% vs. 35% (12%)

Standardized nonpharmacologic protocols for
NAS
71% (Oct.-Dec. 2019) vs.
93% ( 22%)

Used standardized pharmacologic protocols for NAS 76% (Oct.-Dec. 2019) vs. 88% (12%)


